ECAB Minutes:

New Committees Forming:

IC 2025 - SPACE CITY HOUSTON, ENGAGE! ADM Lucy Ferron Franck, IC 2025 Chair, SCC# 53002



The moniker "Space City"

has been used since the early 1960's in Houston, Texas, to show the connection between the city, the new U.S. space program, and the construction of Johnson Space Center and Mission Control. The crew of the USS Zavala, the host chapter, thought it fitting to use it as the theme, incorporating both the host city and Star Trek.

The weekend kicked off with the annual meeting of the Admiralty Board on Friday, July 31. As other members arrived, they checked in at the registration desk, received their specially made metal name badge, conference swag bag, and took a first look at the silent auction offerings. The swag bag included visitor information, pens, stickers, water bottle, 3D printed challenge coin, wrist bands, National Space Society materials, and an IC logo imprinted travel pouch. Bags for the Cadets included puzzles, books, and a light stick. Close to 150 items were donated for the silent auction. One hundred and eleven members were registered, and 104 attended.

The first activity of the IC was the Friday night Marine Dress Mess. The STARFLEET Marines auxiliary, the 3rd Brigade, and the 302nd Horse Marines of the USS Zavala, delivered an exciting and fun evening for all of the attendees. Introductions, toasts, whimsical table centerpieces with Star Trek themed bottles, chewable "crayons," a fine meal shared with friends, awards, a short play, followed by music and dancing made the night really memorable. The annual tribute to Marines who have passed on since the last IC was solemnly held before the frivolity. Zavala engineer John Stein put together a ship's bell and a stand for it he made that was used as part of the ceremonies. The elaborate table centerpieces, made by Christy Ruby and Mary Muller, were later auctioned to add to the charity

fundraiser. A big thank you goes to the Marines on the chapter, region brigade, and auxiliary leadership level who worked hard to make the Mess the best we've seen yet.

Opening session on Saturday morning, August 1, saw everyone gathered in the large meeting room space to participate in the annual roll call of all STARFLEET chapters. Their "Klingon Customs and Culture" presentation was designed to help us start understanding how to interact successfully with Klingons. Do'val, Zo'Ric, marte'Q, and moraq Sutai-lungqlj brought honor to their Houses.

Tactical Auxiliary Director, Michael Rosen, held a session on what is new in the gaming-verse, as well as coordinating the gaming activities both Friday and Saturday nights.

A new feature for IC was incorporated this year. We set up a tour of the nearby Space Center Houston for all those who were interested and purchased a group ticket in advance of IC. Nearly all of our out-of-town visiting members chose this option and members of the Zavala helped by providing transportation down the street (it was way too hot to walk) as needed. Through a connection with the Sciences Auxiliary Director, we were very fortunate to have 3 science professionals who volunteered to lead our members on very special personalized tours and shared their own work with the space program. Members were highly complementary afterwards of the special attention from Johnson Space Center scientists Phyllis Friello and Will Green, and Flight Surgeon Dr. David Alexander. Will Green joined STARFLEET the day after the tour!



Final Mission

The Final Mission was held prior to the dinner Saturday night. This traditional and solemn ceremony, organized by DJ O'Brien, recognizes STARFLEET members and Star Trek actors and production team members who have gone on to the Final Frontier since we last met at IC 2024. Several members

volunteered to carry and fold the flag, while others represented regions of the organization. MarkAdam Miller read the list of names. FADM David Nottage accepted the flag on behalf of all the crewmates and loved ones of the deceased.

The Saturday night Admiral's Banquet was an elegant affair with everyone dressed in their best. Attractive table centerpieces were created by Wendy Weston and Esther Melendez. Quark's Bar was kept very busy again that night. A tasteful meal was followed by the presentation of promotions and more awards by FADM Nottage and Region 4 RC Ron Coleman. STARFLEET Fandom Academy awards were also announced. A highlight of the evening was the after-dinner speaker, Corinne Moore of Kall Morris, Inc., a commercial space endeavor company. Corinne, a leader of proposal management at KMI, and a former NASĂ Control Manager, introduced us to their latest project in conjunction with NASA, the "orbital tow truck" recently tested on the International Space Station in an experimental size. When it becomes a full-size reality, this orbiting satellite will be able to "grab" satellites and other orbiting devices or space junk for repair or disposal. This was the first time that KMI has allowed a public presentation on this new technology, and we were privileged to have one of their leaders to present and take questions. More music and dancing and socializing followed.

Despite a late night of fun, most attendees were up and ready Sunday morning for the last day of IC. "Ask the Brass" started the day and enabled members to ask questions of the STARFLEET Executive Committee members who were present or joining via Zoom. Following that, COMM Laurie McFarland led an interview and Q&A with CS candidate Ryan Case

and VCS candidate Richard Sams, who joined from the UK via Zoom.

The Closing Session followed with the Commander of STARFLEET and the IC Chair wrapping everything up for the official end of IC 2025. It was announced that the silent auction had raised \$2514.00 thanks to all the items contributed by many members. Five hundred dollars will be given to The Planetary Society for their educational programs and scholarships, and the remaining amount will be added to the SFI Scholarship Fund. Before members started wandering off, a group picture to commemorate the IC was taken. Many attendees then took solo or group pictures with the Captain's Chair display. With lots of hugs, congratulations, well wishes, and fond farewells, the attendees of IC 2025 started dispersing. It was hard to part from friends old and new who had traveled to gather for business, fun and a celebration of STARFLEET.

Attendees who were staying over until Monday had an after-party poolside with pizza at the hotel.

As IC 2025 Chair, I wrote the proposal, liaised with the hotel, arranged the space center tour, and organized activities for the weekend (with a million little details). The IC would not have come off as it did without the months of work by the crew of the USS Zavala, who gave their talent, time, and financial resources to achieve the very successful event for STARFLEET. I hope most attendees got to meet them as their enthusiasm for hosting IC certainly contributed to the excitement of the weekend. Measured by how many attendees shook my hand, hugged me, congratulated us, and said what a good time they had, I would say IC 2025 was an overwhelming success. After the bills were paid, we even made a profit, something that I'm

told has not happened for an IC in at least 10 years. I am deeply proud and extremely grateful to all those who helped with the IC in some form, including the SFI Quartermaster who funneled all the payments, and the CS whose encouragement and assistance was so valuable. ICs are in so many ways like a family reunion, and I hope there are more reunions to come. Thank you to all the attendees who have shared their photos and happy memories with us!

Greetings, fellow Fleeters and Trekkers!

Fall changes are in the air and before long we will have changes in STARFLEET as well. It has been an honor to serve as your Chief of Communications and to oversee the redevelopment of the department, and the addition of many talented and dedicated Comms staff members.

Thanks to Public Relations Manager T. Jeznach, STARFLEET again had an ad in DragonCon print material in August. The graphic for the half page ad in the Quick Start Guide was expertly made by Gerhard Pretorius. We should have an ad in the souvenir program book for the Trek Tour cons, starting with the recent one in Las Vegas, but I haven't seen a copy yet of that print piece. TJ is working to secure ad space in cons this fall and winter. A hurdle he ran into for the Tokyo Comic Con is that the form to complete is only in Japanese and he is seeking help getting that filled out. Assistant Public Relations Manager Clive Burrell worked to get co-branded business cards for STARFLEET and Region 20 printed to distribute at the recent Destination con in London, which doesn't have a printed guide.

Social Media Services, under Manager Ben Thomas, is keeping our sites and groups running smoothly. It was a pretty good month he reports, with only a couple of people trying to get to the Facebook groups without answering the required questions to verify current membership. Some people have tried to post non-SFI related content to the business group, but those attempts were deleted. A few members have been asked to restrict the amount they post each day due to the overwhelming amount they were trying to post which can interfere with often important or more relevant information. Assistant SMS Manager Andrew Reist continues to assist the Sciences Auxiliary by posting their monthly "Sol Series" programs to the SFI YouTube channel. We deeply appreciate the work of the social media admins and moderators who keep our sites going smoothly every day without fanfare.

The CQ Editor and staff have stayed busy in August and September to ready the CQ for publication. Staff Writers have been preparing their contributions, including an interview with the USS Animus of R11 on Oz Comic Con, a fun beverage poll, a review of the new book *Inspired* Enterprise, and the ever-helpful upcoming cons listing. Deputy Chief of Comms, and Mailchimp Manager, Trisha Tunis has been working on a purge of the email list to keep it under the maximum allowed without the need to authorize our domain. SHORE LEAVE 45 Interviews

Dean on the Scene for CQ SNAPSHOTS! We are at the tail end of Shore Leave 45 and what can I say? I got a Vulcan standing next to me. In fact, we met two years ago at the D&I icon in Philly. We did the Vulcan mind meld in a selfie and everything. And I was wearing my Picard outfit for the first time, she loved it. We have the wonderful Stephanie Czajkowski!

How you doing, Stephanie? Good, thanks for having me.

I'm so glad to see you again. I cannot believe it's been two years. Has it been two years. I feel like it's been one year, but then it is two years, and then I'm all kinds of confused.

It feels like it's just, was this just two days ago? How does it feel to be one of the honored guests at the 45th Shore Leave?

Oh, it's been fantastic. There's the thing about Shore Leave, because it's run by fans. It so takes care of their fans, and, as a result, takes care of us. And if you're someone who likes to interact with fans, it's just like being welcomed into an even larger family. I feel like the Star Trek franchise lends itself to that, because the fans are so inclusive. And this is ... this just doubles down on it.

It really does, especially meeting great fans and great actors like you. It makes going to conventions after 31 years still worthwhile.

You know, it really does, because it's like a family reunion. You become part of the family.

You were in Star Trek: Picard as Lieutenant T'Veen. I want you to talk about being part of that series. were you a Star Trek fan prior to getting the role?

I actually was not, kind of by default. I wouldn't say like, "Oh, I was someone who went to cons." I wasn't to that level. But my father was a giant *Star Trek* fan. He was just someone who watched it. The first movie I saw in the theater was *Star Trek*: *The Motion Picture* when I was a child and my brother was a toddler. And then later I watched the original series with him.

My mother was a seamstress and a costume designer. When *The Voyage Home* came out, she actually worked



for a costume shop and was making those Admiral jackets for people who were cosplaying. And when it came out, we went to a premiere event where they had invited *Star Trek* fans. It was my first experience experiencing cosplay before it was actually something people did all the time. People were super judgy.

And then I watched *The Next Generation*, loved Patrick Stewart. So, it was like it was threaded through my life. But it wasn't until I walked onto that bridge that I was like, "Holy crap", that I really realized how deeply it was enmeshed in my DNA.

Tell us your first thoughts of walking onto that bridge, seeing the OGs. You see Riker, La Forge and Picard.

Thankfully, that didn't happen the first day. It was like an easy in the first day where everyone who was on the bridge. So, it was nice to be around people who were being enmeshed into the world. So, there was a group of us who were brand new, right? It wasn't just me and Todd, who I knew personally. I knew prior to the show. I got a text message, because we're friends on Facebook, that he was like, "Hey, are you on my bridge?" And I was like, "What!?!" because I hadn't seen the call sheet yet.

So, it was meeting Jeri (Ryan) first, and then meeting Jonathan, and then

meeting Patrick. Then later it was everybody. So, it was a gradual. It wasn't the whole McGillicuddy at once, but walking on that bridge is iconic. And you realize that while you're there. And you know every day, because once you start work, then you just get through it, you have to remind yourself, every day, I would take a minute to just sit at my station and look and realize how lucky I was to be there.

Tell me about it, and you played a great officer. If you weren't playing your role, what position would you see yourself on the bridge?
I think I would either be a pilot or I would be in weaponry. I'd be just like firing bombs if I wasn't Worf's long lost daughter.

I agree. You would play that so well. I had also seen you as Chyna in Young Rock, that was mind blowing. What did it feel like to step into the shoes of an iconic wrestler who we lost too soon?

That was such an awesome responsibility, and it happened so fast. I literally auditioned on a Monday and I was on a plane on a Thursday. And thankfully, I had been a fan of Chyna's. When I was much younger, and when she was at her height, I was her height. I had long, dark, brown hair. I worked as a fitness instructor. When I was training at the gym, 17 to 18 people would come and be like,

"You look like you belong on WWE."
I, at the time, was like, "go away."
But when you saw her in the world, for people who were my height, for women who were hot and strong, you didn't see that. It was lovely to have a representation

So, it was a deep dive because the thing about it is when you're playing someone who existed, you want to find their essence, but you don't want to be a caricature. You want to do your version of it that pays homage to who they were as a human. And in particular, like this is so much about their persona rather than who they were. I spent a lot of time watching & re watching the 1998 Ladder Battle because I wanted to get the physicality of her walking outside. For in that battle, she wasn't on. She was just Triple X's, like bodyguard. They hadn't let her in the ring yet. It was just a lot of that. I will say, because Picard hadn't come out yet.

Right.

I did not understand fandom. I will never forget being in my outfit, and they were shooting Memphis. And they were starting to shoot the ladder match, and they had gotten me all done. When I walked in, and they had a bunch of wrestling fans were like, "Chyna!" I was like, "Oh, what?" And it was just overwhelming energy and the love you felt. I was like, "Oh, now I get it." And it was such an intro, because I'd never experienced anything like that before, but it did give me a little taste of what being at the Picard premiere would be like. And so that was nice, because I was like, "Oh!" Because I'd never done anything like that.

Speaking of fandom, you really, really killed it on Friday at karaoke. I was having such a great time. So, tell us about that experience for those who were not in attendance, because honestly, in all the years I've done conventions & gone to karaoke, I have never seen so many stars in one night.

Yeah, we came out hard, didn't we?

You did! You did so well, all of you! Thank you, yeah. Well, Steven, who you interviewed earlier, and got up and did Bonnie Tyler. And I jumped up to help him. I kind of blew the top notes out. It was fun, though. And I think that also Bonnie Gordon, who I'm good friends with, was like, "Oh, you can

sing." I'm like, "Yeah, I can sing. I grew up doing musical theater. That's what I wanted to do."

I basically kind of pivoted away a little bit, because there weren't a lot of roles for people in my voice. I have a contra alto that didn't drop until I was slightly older, right? For musical theater, at least when I was coming up, you had to be 40 to play the roles that I could



sing. I was like, "Well, I guess I'll go hold a gun instead." It was super fun to just do it and also watch. But one of my favorite things about cons is just the fact that so many people are so talented. Like we're the crazy ones, I guess who decided to like see what we can do with it. And if we're lucky, we get to be on Star Trek. But the world is full of talent. The world is full of talent.

Absolutely, especially since J. Lee, my brother from another mother, pulled me out to do karaoke. I did it, and had a great time. I gotta ask from one musical kid to another, what is your favorite?

See, it always changes. I think I'll always go back to *Les Mis*. The first thing I saw that made me cry like I had never had a piece of theater or movie hit me so emotionally. I think I always have to go back to *Les Mis*. Then after that, it's *Jesus Christ Superstar* because of my family, I was raised on *Jesus Christ Superstar*.

I'm a big fan of like Sondheim and just obscure musicals because I was on the musical theater tracks. There's a bunch of stuff that I know that a lot of people don't, or unless you're super,

musical theater nerd.

Well, I'm definitely one, because I've seen Les Mis, Mamma Mia. My favorites are Phantom of the Opera, Les Mis and Rent.

It's funny because I'm not as big on *Rent* as so many people are. It's so weird to me. I got it on a big Sondheim, not *A Little Night Music*. I love passions. I just really love his verbiage, and I love the fact that all of his songs are so active.

I think it also has to do with my first professional job was playing a Follies girl in a "Salute to Sondheim" in the late 90s. It might have been 30 or 40 years ago. I was a father's bride with a hat on, and Elaine Stritch was there. She was in the elevator with me. I will never forget just being in an elevator with Elaine Stritch.

Oh, I am jealous of you right now. If you have to talk to the person who's never been to a convention and wants to go to their very first one. What advice would you give them?

I would say smaller ones are better, like smaller curated ones like this are kind of nicer because they're so welcoming. I think people come in and they're like, "I'm a stranger in a strange land." And when you're someone who loves something, you're not a stranger, because pretty much everybody there also loves the same thing. Like, you're family, you just haven't realized it yet.

Also, I say, if you have a friend you can go with who's done it before, go. Because it's always nice to have a sidekick. Have that sidekick or a buddy but also be open and go experience. Part of the reason you're there is you're looking for community. And the way to have community is to go to karaoke. You don't have to drink, but go to the bars and talk to people, and just be willing to talk to people.


KELVIN KORNER: WHO IS KHAN?

There are fourteen *Star Trek* films,

and none have been more divisive than Star Trek Into Darkness (ST:ID). And yet, it's the most financially successful entry in the franchise: \$467.4 million in the box office. So why do some Trekkies outright hate it? Let's address the elephant on the bridge: changing the lore of Khan Noonien Singh was always going to be a controversial decision—not to say Benedict Cumberbatch's portrayal of the brilliant and ruthless tyrant wasn't outstanding. But with no context given, it's easy to see why fans were so confused.



Following ST:ID's theatrical run, IDW Publishing released a five-issue miniseries, *Star Trek Khan*, later released as one volume. Intended as both a prequel and a sequel to the 2013 film, it gives us Khan's proper (alternate) backstory.

Attention all hands: a <u>spoiler warning</u> is in effect.

Now then, shall we begin?

We open in Federation court, where Khan Noonien Singh is on trial to answer for his crimes, as well as reveal his collaboration efforts with Starfleet's late leader Admiral Alexander Marcus. At the prosecution desk, a Federation attorney representing Captain James T. Kirk and Commander Spock of the USS Enterprise. The story is told through Khan's court testimony and flashbacks as the captain and first officer question him on the stand.

Of course, Khan spills the beans about the development of augmented super humans in the 20th century, his rise to power in the Eugenics Wars and his eventual escape from Earth with seventy-two other augments in the SS Botany Bay. Well-known lore.

Then the USS *Kelvin* was destroyed in 2233. Nothing would ever be the same again.

This time, it won't be Captain Kirk and the *Enterprise* that find Khan in prime 2267 during their five-year mission of exploration, but a ship called *Vanguard* in alternate 2258. Nine years before the events of "Space Seed" (TOS) in the Prime timeline.


Shortly after Vulcan's destruction, Admiral Marcus had deep space vessels secretly commissioned to search distant quadrants of space for threats against the Federation; the Vanguard was one of those ships. Marcus was head of Section 31, Starfleet's black ops division tasked with developing advanced weaponry and training officers to gather intelligence on perceived enemies of the Federation. Upon researching Khan's upbringing and scientific and engineering prowess, Marcus knew he'd hit the motherlode. But he had to shroud Khan's past in absolute secrecy.

Khan was brought back to Section 31's secret lo Facility behind Jupiter. There, the unconscious tyrant of Indian descent had his skin color and voice surgically altered, as well as his memory wiped and given a whole new identity: **John Richard Harrison**, a white, UK-born Starfleet lieutenant. He is fed false information about his life and career, including having no records of family or friends outside of Starfleet. How convenient.

Harrison spends months developing gadgets and weapons for Section 31, including a prototype of the personal transwarp beaming device later found by Montgomery Scott in the wreckage of the Daystrom Conference Room. In the meantime, bits and pieces of Marcus's right-hand man past life

begin to emerge. Using his transwarp beaming device, Harrison embarks on a solo mission to bomb a vital mining facility on Praxis—moon of the Klingon homeworld Kronos.

Teleporting to the uninhabited Ketha Province on Kronos, he watches as his bomb rips Praxis wide open. Taking delight in his destructive capabilities, John Harrison finally snaps out of his brainwashing: *My name is Khan*. His only focus now is to be reunited with his crew.



Interestingly, Praxis suffers a similar fate in the Prime timeline in 2293 (*Star Trek VI: The Undiscovered Country*). Instead of a bomb, the explosion is due to labor malpractice.

To achieve his ultimate plan, Khan devises a scheme. He would pose as Admiral Marcus and send a message to his Section 31 engineers to store the rest of his fellow frozen augments inside untraceable torpedoes he'd been working on. The same ones that would almost be used by Acting-Captain Sulu of the Enterprise on Kronos. Once Khan's crew were hidden and secure, the torpedoes would be smuggled out as cargo in a commandeered starship. The augments would depart Earth and search for a new world to colonize. Always a step ahead, Admiral Marcus uncovers Khan's attempt to rescue them. After this, the augment-turned-

Starfleet-officer goes into hiding until the bombing of the Kelvin Memorial Archive, aka Section 31's London facility.

We not only have our much-needed context for Khan's changed appearance, but have new insight into his puppet master, Admiral Alexander Marcus.

While the movie portrays him as a paranoid, traumatized man willing to commit war crimes to protect Earth, his motives are deeply sinister in *Star Trek Khan*. Marcus doesn't want to just protect Earth. He won't stop until the United Federation of Planets becomes the dominant power in the galaxy. His desire is to, in his own words, "bring entire civilizations to their knees." It was never about Starfleet's creed of galactic peace, but of one man's thirst for unfettered power.

The courtroom segments carry a tense

atmosphere. The remorseless Khan isn't there to plead his innocence—he knows there's no way out of this—but to let the entire Federation know why he did what he did. In making the means justify the ends, he murdered dozens of civilians, Klingons, and Starfleet officers alike. More than anything, he was an authoritarian who ruled more than a quarter of the Earth in the 1990s. There is nothing honorable about Khan, what he did, and why. Neither in the Prime nor Kelvin timelines.

Just imagine if Admiral Marcus had been spared or saved in ST:ID. It would have been satisfying seeing someone who took advantage of Starfleet's principles try to justify his paranoia to the Federation courts. But his three-hundred-year-old adversary won the battle and the war.

With that said, I'll leave the ending up to you to read for yourself. It offers a

bleak conclusion to Khan's arc in the Kelvinverse. The important thing is that—at the risk of sounding cliché—one of Starfleet's most dangerous foes can never kill, or rule with an iron fist, again.

That is, of course, until the Kelvin Enterprise crew eventually comes across a Borg cube on the edge of Federation space. In fact, the Starfleet Corps of Engineers should probably just get to work on that Kelvin Enterprise-B a few movies ahead of schedule.

Regardless of what you thought of Star Trek Into Darkness, this short series from IDW is packed with explosive action and plenty of suspense, leading to shocking revelations and a jaw-dropping showdown we didn't see on the big screen.

Greetings from the office of the Inspector General. Well by the time you read this report, the voting phase of the Commander, STARFLEET election will be finished. As you already know, the team of Admiral Ryan Case and Admiral Richard Sams were the only candidates in the election this year. That means we held a vote of confidence for the team instead of a typical election. We also had a referendum to vote on. Specifically, changing the wording of our bylaws and handbook from North Carolina as our charter to making it national and flexible to work with the state we choose to use as the charter. The results of the votes on both those issues will be posted in another venue. I want to take this opportunity to first thank every one of you who participated in the voting process. As I always say, voting in the CS election provides a key voice for you as the

individual member to choose the leadership for the organization.

The R5 Regional Coordinator election has concluded with Commodore Laurie McAndrew being reelected as Regional Coordinator. R17 is currently going through their election cycle and R9 will begin their election cycle on October 1, 2025.

In the field of investigations, IG Investigation #2506-02002 has completed with the defendant deciding to leave STARFLEET. IG Investigation #2507-08003 is under final review before being sent to the Commander, STARFLEET for decision. It is rare, but I do want to say something regarding our investigation process.

When a complaint is lodged and the CS decides for us to investigate the issue, I can speak for my entire IG team that we do our best in doing a thorough investigation. We work with the Judge Advocates Office to ensure both sides of the issue are covered and that both the complainant and defendant get a fair say. I encourage any member that is going through the process to let things play out and cooperate with our investigative team. Sometimes defendants get upset with the fact they are being investigated and rage quit instead of going through the process. As

annotated in our Membership Handbook, those refusing to cooperate in an active investigation are subject to immediate dismissal from STARFLEET. Once you are expelled from fleet, that closes the book on our being able to do a fair and impartial investigation since you are no longer in STARFLEET. Of course, it is your decision and right to leave but I urge you to work with the process. The JAG does an outstanding job of representing the defendant in a case and will do his best to tell your side of the story. I just want to make sure that our members fully understand the process and not to feel scared or intimidated when being confronted with an investigation. Thank you.

BOOK REVIEW: INSPIRED ENTERPRISE


Inspired Enterprise: How NASA, the Smithsonian, and the Aerospace Community Helped Launch Star Trek by Glen E. Swanson with a Foreword by Margeret Wietekamp PhD

Inspired Enterprise was not quite what I expected going in with just the title. The premise was refreshingly different from many of the books that I've been through over the years. As fans of Star Trek, we are frequently inundated with pieces (rightfully) celebrating the many influences Trek has had on the science industry. It could be, and for the most part, has been easily forgotten how big a role the science world played in building up and supporting the series.

Focusing less on the nuts and bolts of production and more on the behind the scenes of writing, supporting, and promoting, it depicts the complexity of getting *Star Trek* off the ground and keeping it soaring. In line with the title, it gives us a solid look at just how much various industries, institutions, agencies, and true lovers of space and science contributed toward doing just that.

While I found the book interesting, it is important to note that it may not be the most approachable work for casual fans of the series. You can tell in the reading that the author is a deeply passionate fan of the franchise. No one else would have undertaken the obviously massive amount of work to so thoroughly research the topic. The result is an almost scholarly book that presents its information in a way that serious fans of the original series and armchair historians (like myself) will appreciate.

It reads very much like a book that discusses the undercurrents of major historical events. Frankly, I think that's an appropriate tone that recognizes the importance of the series that helped solidify so much of what science fiction television would become. That seriousness is blended well with stories from interviews and a sense of genuine love for the subject matter. The resulting title has enough character to just be a good read for those interested in the relationship between Star Trek and the science industry. It certainly has enough meat on its bones that it could be used as a go-to book on its topic. However, it is



so well constructed that it could serve as solid launching pad for anyone interested in furthering their knowledge.

In addition to the text of the main body, the expansive end notes and bibliography combine with the properly contextualized images to help the reader get a firm grasp of the information presented. The index will be especially handy for those who choose to include this book as a worthy part of their reference library (as I surely will).

While it is such a unique volume that any attempt to give it a one-to-ten

rating would be unfair, I am confident that hardcore fans and those interested in the outside influences that helped *Star Trek* begin its flight to the "Final Frontier" will find it a worthwhile read. I mean, I put down *The Autobiography of Benjamin Sisko* for this.

This past month has been a busy and rewarding one for medical operations. Our community continues to grow, our members are being recognized for their contributions, and training achievements are reaching new milestones. The dedication shown across registrations, awards, challenges, and appointments highlights the strength and commitment of our medical staff.

Registrations

Our numbers remain strong. Four new members joined this month, while one departed, bringing our total registered to 426.

Medical Awards Issued

Recognition of service remains an important part of our mission. This month, 22 certificates were issued. Members were honoured with the Dr Crusher Award, the Nurse Chapel Award, and service awards marking milestones of 1 year (bronze), 3 years (silver), and 5 years (gold).

Training Awards Issued

Training has been a major area of activity.

- Certifications: Two SFMD certifications were completed. No new completions in the Interspecies Medical Exchange Program this period.
- CORE Medical Training Program: Several members advanced through levels, with two completing the program in full at Level 10
- Specialist Medical Training Program: A wide range of certifications were earned, though no new graduations this
 month.
- Engineering Extension Course: Four members successfully completed their training.

In total, 45 certificates were issued in training this month.

Challenges

TREK TO NEW JERSEY

A First-Time Con-Goer's View

As a little girl in 1990, I saw advertisements for Star Trek conventions featuring stars of TOS and TNG. I asked my parents if I could go, but it was a non-starter. Life happened over the following decades, and while my love of *Star Trek* only grew, my childhood dream of attending a con was largely forgotten.

I joined STARFLEET earlier this year and have spent time with a lot of good people on my ship, the USS *Justice*. Hearing about some of the adventures they've had at past conventions resurrected that long-buried wish. So, this year, I attended my first convention. Creation's Trek to New Jersey convention was held on September 6 and 7 at the Hanover Marriott in Whippany. I attended on the 6th, believing I had a pretty good idea of what to expect. After all, I'd read about cons. I watched panels on YouTube.

I arrived early enough to check in before the theater opened, running into our CO and another shipmate almost immediately. At least I knew I'd have someone to talk to as the day wore on! I headed to the vendor room, certain that nothing would surprise me. That confidence melted into a little puddle, evaporating into the nether.

There, ahead and to my left, was Michelle Hurd. She was just sitting there chatting animatedly with a fan. I'd seen Raffi on television dozens of times, but here she was, ten feet away!

I'll admit, my brain bluescreened for a moment while I recalibrated to this new reality. I had known that actors would be on the vendor floor, yet somehow, I'd expected them to be apart from the crowd in some way. I hadn't worked out the details in my mind, but a sort of hazy platform or stage was half-formed in my imagination. This wasn't that. This was just mingling with Michelle Hurd, as if she were one of us ordinary people!

I spotted a few other actors at their tables, and this time I took it a little more in stride. Except when it came to Terry Farrell. Jadzia Dax has been my favorite character in all of Trek since DS9 premiered when I was 13 years old. There sat a woman who I knew wasn't Jadzia, but who certainly looked and sounded exactly like her. I

found myself unable to look directly at her, like I thought my eyes might melt.

I passed through the hotel lobby at one point, and there was Tim Russ on a couch. Surrounded by luggage, he appeared to have just arrived from the airport and was deep in conversation with someone who seemed to be assisting him.

That's when it happened. The excitement of the day so far just overtook me, and the next thing I knew, I found myself waving at Tim Russ from across the lobby as if we were familiar with one another, me and my old pal, Tim. Needless to say, Tim did not wave back. I'm uncertain whether he even saw me. I hope that he didn't.

For the next hour or two, my brain replayed that wave over and over, helpfully reminding me at length about what an idiot I am.



I had paid for a photo op with Terry and Nicole de Boer and managed to find my way there without making a further fool of myself. Nana Visitor was finishing up her photo ops and briefly greeted the fans waiting in the hall. I was actually in a daze for the next several minutes, still unable to process that Terry was right there. When my turn came up, I let the ladies know that my cat is named Dax, which made them both smile. It must have been clear how nervous I was, because Terry hugged me after my photo and reassured me that I was okay. I couldn't even remember whether I'd smiled in the photo until I picked it up an hour later. As it turned out, I was grinning like a kid on Christmas.

I attended a number of panels, including Anthony Rapp, the ladies of DS9 (Terry, Nicole, and Nana), Michelle Hurd, and Gates McFadden. I watched part of the costume contest and even participated in the Wheel of Trivia (I was eliminated almost immediately – The questions were really tricky!).

What I'll remember most, though, is meeting Terry for her autograph. I was too nervous to approach her table for quite a while. Our ship's Communications Chief very kindly offered to go with me. Eventually, though, I summoned the courage to go on my own.

I had spent all day trying to decide what to say to her. When it was my turn to go up to her table, though, she looked me right in the eyes and smiled. Instantly, it was as if all the bones left my body, along with most of my brain cells and any part of me that had ever resembled "cool."

"I've been watching Star Trek since I was ten years old. Jadzia is my favorite character in the whole franchise. Thank you for bringing her to life." The words came out of me in one long, run-on sentence, syllables melting into one another before my tongue even caught up. For the briefest of moments, I felt as if I were watching myself standing there, sticking this photo in this beautiful woman's face while simpering like a puppy.

Terry was wonderful, gracious, and kind. She didn't make me feel like the absolute goon I was in that moment.

Our CO and Comms Chief were around when I got Nicole to sign my photo. I managed to get through that interaction without gushing. Nicole spotted the Riker pillow and asked to see it more closely, turning it side to side with a look of amusement mixed with mild distaste. The Riker pillow is a sort of mascot for the USS *Justice*. It was gifted to the ship after being found at an animal shelter. It has Commander Riker's face, making the most ridiculous expression of sleepiness and a little something extra.

At last, the evening came to a close. I went to dinner with three shipmates and relived the day while also taking in stories from them of conventions past. Perhaps one day I'll be the one casually chatting about the time I spent twenty minutes talking to LeVar Burton or watching Dominic Keating sing karaoke.

It took 35 years for me to attend my first convention. I'm glad I finally went, even if it did turn me back into a 10-year-old girl a couple of times. It won't take me another 35 years to go again.

Chopped, Diced or Minced?

Sometimes, it can be hard to work out if your onion is chopped finely enough. The question is, does it matter? Well, it very much depends upon the ingredient in question and the recipe. Whole cloves of garlic are wonderful in a dish of Mediterranean roasted vegetables. They have a lovely, sweet, caramelised quality, but not the kick you have of raw garlic. The same goes for small onions if you roast them. They are truly delightful.

In other words, the size of your pieces does affect flavour. Finer chops release more flavour that melts into the dish, while larger chunks give a stronger flavour and aroma. Mincing or crushing will also cook more quickly. But how finely does finely chopped mean?

A **CHOPPED ONION** usually involves slicing an onion, turning it and slicing it again to make chunks about ½" thick, but anything between ¼" to ¾" is just fine.

A **DICED ONION** is more or less the same thing but aim for pieces about 1/4" to 1/2" instead.

A **MINCED ONION** is getting the pieces as small as you can by going over them a number of times with the cutting edge of the knife.

But it's not a precision thing, so try not to get too hung up on it—experiment a little!

Both targ and pork go beautifully with this redcurrant jelly and apple twist.

Ingredients

- boneless targ (pork loin steaks) for two, trimmed of any fat
- ½ large red onion, roughly chopped
- 1 red apple, cored and cut into wedges (sixteen)
- 2 tsp Chinese five-spice powder
- 2 tbsp sunflower oil
- 1 tbsp redcurrant jelly
- ½ tbsp red wine vinegar or cider

vinegar

- 100ml (just shy of half a cup) chicken stock
- ¾ tsp bicarbonate of soda (baking soda).

Method

- Pat the pork dry and sprinkle with bicarbonate of soda on both sides. Leave for 15 minutes (no longer) to tenderise. Then rinse off and pat dry again.
- Mix the five-spice with the oil on a plate and dip the pork ensuring all sides are covered. Leave sitting in the mixture. (Can be left to marinade if you are prepping for a later meal.)
- 3. Combine the redcurrant jelly, vinegar and stock in a jug.
- Heat a little oil in a frying pan and fry the pork for 1-2 minutes on each side until browned and just cooked through.
- 5. Transfer to a plate.
- Add a little more oil to the pan, reduce the heat slightly and fry the onions for 2 minutes.
- Add the apples and cook, stirring occasionally, for another 3 minutes.
- 8. Stir in the stock mixture.
- Bring to the boil and simmer rapidly for 8-10 minutes, until the sauce is slightly syrupy and the apples are tender.
- 10. Gently reheat the pork in the sauce, turning to glaze each side.

SPICED BISCUITS

These may seem very plain and simple, but the spices are irresistible to my Klingon diners!

Ingredients

- 125g butter
- 150g caster (superfine/baker's) sugar
- 1 egg yolk
- 225g plain flour
- 2 tsp cinnamon
- 1 tsp mixed spice (similar to pumpkin spice)
- Variation: Swap the cinnamon for ground ginger!

Method

- 1. Grease 2 large baking trays and heat oven to 180°C (356°F).
- 2. Cream butter and sugar.
- Add egg yolk and beat well.
- 4. Add spices to sieved flour.
- 5. Stir in flour into a fairly stiff dough.
- 6. Knead lightly and roll out to 5mm (a bit less then 1/4" thick.
- 7. Cut into rounds.
- Sprinkle with granulated sugar and press lightly into the biscuits with fingertips.
- 9. Bake for 12-13 minutes until firm and a light brown colour.



TREK TECH

Hello there fellow CQ'ers,

I was unfortunately away on a classified mission last issue but I'm back again, hopefully just as good as before.

This issue we will be focusing on medical technology, without which many of our favourite heroes would be as good as gone. So, we will be looking at four in particular, the hypospray, the dermal regenerator and the bio bed...as well as the everfabulous EMH (well, the Mark I is fabulous, I suppose we still have to decide on the Mark II).

Hypospray

The hypospray is a piece of medical technology used to administer injections without the need for needles, making it a revolutionary advancement in med tech. The hypospray operates with a highvelocity, pressurised medication delivery system, combining advanced nanotechnology with precise targeting systems. Unlike traditional hypodermic needles, the hypospray uses a fine, aerosolised spray of medication that is injected through the skin via a rapid, controlled burst of pressurised gas; usually compressed air. The device is equipped with a sophisticated sensor array and targeting interface, allowing medical personnel to accurately identify injection sites and ensure proper dosage, although usually it is just the neck that gets it (STAR TREK "First Contact", STAR TREK 2009), to minimise patient discomfort and infection risk. It could also be used in reverse, taking samples from the air for analysis at a later time (TNG "Genesis")

The hypospray features a sleek, handheld unit with a replaceable cartridge which contains the medication in a precise dose. The

hypospray uses a laser emitter that activates the medication aerosol, which is then propelled through a nozzle at high speed. The hypospray's advanced technology also allows for the precise control of medication dosage, making it adaptable for administering a wide range of drugs, from antibiotics to painkillers.

The hypospray's portability and ease of use make it ideal for emergency situations and battlefield conditions, where rapid, sterile injections are crucial. In the context of medical ethics and safety, the hypospray represents a significant improvement over traditional methods, reducing the risk of cross-contamination and accidental injury. While hypodermic needles are limited by their invasive nature, potential for pain, and risk of infection, the hypospray's design focuses on safety, comfort, and efficiency, especially in emergency or highvolume settings. Additionally, the hypospray can deliver medication without the need for numerous sterile needles or syringes, making it more practical for repeated use and reducing medical waste. Overall, the hypospray exemplifies a futuristic approach that prioritizes patient comfort and safety, contrasting with the more invasive and sometimes riskier traditional needle-based methods.


While purely fictional at one point and only seen in Star Trek, the hypospray concept draws inspiration from real-world advancements in trans dermal drug delivery systems, such as jet injectors and aerosolised medications, which are actively researched and developed today from companies such as, funnily enough, <u>HYPOSPRAY</u> and researchers at <u>MIT</u>

Dermal Regenerator

The dermal regenerator is a versatile, handheld medical device used in Star Trek to heal wounds, regenerate tissue, and treat injuries rapidly and non-invasively. It functions by emitting a focused energy beam, often depicted as a type of directed plasma or bio-electric energy, which stimulates cellular regeneration and accelerates the healing processes, offering a significant advantage over traditional medical treatments such as bandages or sutures. When applied to a patient's skin or injury site, the dermal regenerator effectively closes wounds (TNG "Frame of Mind"), repairs burns (VOY "One") and treats damage

without the need for sutures or invasive procedures, making it invaluable in emergency situations and battlefield medicine. The device typically has a targeting interface that allows precise application, along with adjustable settings to tailor the healing process for different types of injuries. It operates on advanced nanotechnology and biotechnological principles, harnessing energy to promote rapid tissue regeneration at a cellular level, reducing healing time from days or weeks to mere minutes (DS9 "Homefront"). Safety features include sensors to detect tissue type and condition, ensuring proper application and preventing damage to healthy tissue. Unlike conventional methods that require physical contact, dressing changes, or invasive procedures, the dermal regenerator utilises directed energy to stimulate the cell regeneration and accelerate tissue repair, effectively closing wounds almost instantly. The dermal regenerator emphasises non-invasive, rapid healing techniques that improve patient outcomes and reduce the need for traditional surgical interventions. The dermal regenerator, like all Trek Tech, can also be used in reverse. It can be used to simulate cuts and burns if the need ever arises, such as when confusing enemies (VOY "Warhead")





Present day wound management, on the other hand, requires multiple steps, sterile environments, and longer recovery periods, increasing the risk of infection and delaying healing.

Although clearly a piece of future tech, it draws inspiration from realworld research into laser therapy, tissue engineering, and regenerative medicine, representing a leap toward minimally invasive, high-tech medical care (LIONS TALK SCIENCE)

Biobeo

The biobed is a sophisticated, multifunctional medical device used to diagnose, monitor, and treat patients efficiently and non-invasively.

Comprised of a large adjustable platform with integrated sensors and diagnostic tools, it can perform rapid, comprehensive medical scans using advanced sensors and imaging technology to assess a patient's internal and external condition. Some versions feature an interface that covers the patient's upper body that allows medical personnel to input data, monitor vital signs, and execute treatment protocols. It is a combination of an advanced diagnostic station and a treatment platform, featuring an efficient design with integrated sensors, holographic interfaces, and robotic attachments. The biobed is capable of administering various therapies, as well as performing minor surgical procedures via robotic arms or laser tools. Its diagnostic capabilities include detecting internal injuries, infections, or anomalies with high precision, simultaneously providing real-time feedback to doctors. The device's design emphasises patient comfort, with features like adjustable supports and soft surfaces. It also operates with minimal invasive intervention, making recovery guicker and more comfortable. The biobed is the pinnacle of medical technologyintegrating diagnostics, treatment, and patient care into a single, efficient system. The biobed's robotic arms can perform precise procedures, such as cleaning wounds, applying medication, or conducting minor surgeries, all while the patient remains comfortable. The device is designed to be highly versatile, capable of treating a wide range of injuries and illnesses, from minor cuts to complex trauma, often with minimal manual intervention. They can be used in quarantine cases where a patient must be separated from the crew, using a forcefield they can create a sterile environment (TNG "Time Squared"). This can even be

used to create an alien atmosphere if needed to keep non-human species alive (VOY "Threshold").

While still fictional, the biobed in Star Trek takes its inspiration from real-world advances in medical imaging, robotic surgery (<u>UMC</u>), and automated patient care systems (<u>NIH</u>), highlighting a future where healthcare is highly technological and precise.

Emergency Medical Hologram

The Emergency Medical Hologram (EMH) is a highly advanced, computer-generated medical program, designed to serve as a fully capable, autonomous doctor in emergency situations when human personnel are unavailable (VOY "Caretaker") The EMH's core technology relies on a combination of holographic projection, real-time data analysis, and access to the ship's medical databases, enabling it to diagnose, treat, and even perform surgical procedures. Its programming allows customization and upgrades, often reflecting the crew's evolving needs and moral dilemmas. The EMH is embodied as a holographic

projection with a humanoid appearance, equipped with extensive medical knowledge, diagnostic abilities, and procedural skills, allowing it to perform complex medical procedures, surgeries, and patient care independently. Programmed with artificial intelligence and adaptability, the EMH MK I (known on the USS Voyager as "The Doctor") was able to learn and improve his capabilities over time, displaying a personality that evolved through his interactions with the crew. Initially created as a temporary medical solution, The Doctor becomes a vital crew member, facing challenges related to his identity and autonomy, raising ethical questions about artificial life and consciousness (VOY "Author, Author"). The Doctor also features a portable, user-friendly interface that can be deployed anywhere on the starship or away missions, utilising holographic projection technology to appear anywhere. This was found on a mission to the past to retrieve technology stolen from the future, don't you just love the Temporal Prime Directive? (VOY "Future's End. Part

The EMH MK I was never meant to run as long as it did, being replaced with the MK II in 2374 (VOY "Message in a Bottle") By 2377 the MK III had been developed and then replaced by the MK IV, showing that even in the far future, technology development never stands still (VOY "Life Line").

While we do not have the holographic technology in the present to create an EMH, the programming behind it can be found in the form of Al (<u>HARVARD GAZETTE</u>) The Al helps doctors find solutions much quicker, finding connections that they may not, helping patients and saving lives.

Shore Leave 45 Provides A Great Away Mission For Our USS *Justice* Crew

As I always say, we know summer is coming when Shore Leave (SL) is right around the corner. Besides the warm weather, this time of year has one of the best Sci-Fi Conventions going on. The group of volunteers that runs this convention, the STAT Club of Maryland, did an outstanding job again this year in organizing the event, held at the Wyndham Lancaster Resort and Convention Center in Lancaster, PA, from July 11th to July 13th.

I started my two-and-a-half-hour journey to SL 45 on the 10th. I couldn't wait to get there and start to enjoy this experience. I arrived early at Lancaster's Fairfield by Marriott Hotel (handily next door to the venue) and, to fill the time until my room would be ready (and as I was a bit hungry anyway), I found a Long John Silver's Restaurant / combo KFC. The food didn't look as good as I remembered, so I settled for a chicken sandwich, to keep me going until dinner.

After checking into my room and unpacking, a rest was in order. I headed to the convention center next door. Later, I met Executive Officer, CAPT Pat Dunne, at the convention hotel and checked where and when registration materials would be available.

For dinner, we took the 30-minute drive to the Shady Maple Restaurant, to experience the largest buffet (I believe), in the country. I must say the place is immense. The food was country Amish-style food, not fancy, but more than sufficient... especially all the desserts! There we met up with two other R7 members, Valerie Rosenberg and Gerry Bush, from the USS Theresa Sylvester. Gerry is also co-hosting the R7 Conference with us, along with the USS Abraham Lincoln.

Friday morning, we arrived about 10 AM at the convention hotel, got our registration materials and went in - the Shore Leave (SL) table was all set up, so I got my SL 45 Polo, an SL Patch, and the new SL Challenge Coin.

Now that it was ready we had time to spare until the convention started, so we went to play mini-golf - same as we did last year, same venue but a different course this time - Pirate Ship and dinosaurs. Not as challenging, in my opinion, but still a lot of fun and very enjoyable. After the mini-golf, I checked in with the Crew on Discord, and at the hotel, and all who were available joined us at the Cracker Barrel Restaurant for lunch.

When we got back, the dealer's room was now set up, although there seemed to be fewer dealers than last year. The number of panels was also fewer than in previous years.

My first panel was called "Wolf at the Door," and in it we discussed how the Federation became the dominant force in the quadrant. In between panels, a few of the crew went for a quick light supper to Panera Bread, which was also close to the convention hotel, and, on our return, a panel called "Chain of Command." This discussion centred around whether or not Captain Jellico was a good Commanding Officer and turned out to be a rather contentious panel. I pointed out, having been in the military, that Captain Jellico was the most realistic version of a Commanding Officer to be shown in Star Trek. There were other veterans in the audience, and each one shared their perspective.

One Vet was a military combat veteran, who didn't like people who had worked in the Intelligence field. As luck would have it, there was another Vet who worked in that very field when he was in the military. So, as you can imagine, they had a great conversation. Later during the convention, I saw that Vet and asked him about his military experiences. He had been in the US Air Force, as was I, and he worked in the Intelligence field in the '80s and '90s. I just wish another member of my Crew, CAPT Tim Longo, had been in that room, so he could have talked about his Commanders on subs. I'm sure that would have been enlightening for everyone.

The two other panels I attended were about Starfleet Academy and Strange New Worlds and both were informative. After those, it was time for Friday Night Bites which was run by independent ST club, the USS Chesapeake. They had brought in lots of food, and our crew took up an entire row by ourselves. Somebody from the hotel asked Lorenzo who had given him permission to bring in food and Lorenzo gave some name, so the person went away, but it seemed the front desk had no idea who authorized him to serve food in a panel room. I guess I'll have to wait until next year to find out what happened...

Saturday morning began, as always with the STARFLEET Region 7 Meeting. As R7 Financial Officer, I gave my financial report, and others gave their Staff Reports.



Following the meeting, a quick foray to the dealer's room before my two separate photo ops, starting at about 11am. The first photo op was with Adrianne Palicki and J. Lee from The Orville. Adrianne was very tall, taller than I had expected, and it made me want to stand as tall as I possibly could. Later, I had a photo op with Dina Meyer and Casper Van Dien from Starship Troopers. Dina's hair caught on my polo shirt as I was walking away... she must have used a lot of hairspray! After collecting both of my photo ops, during the free autograph session, I got Dina and Casper's autographs, and I also had J. Lee and

After dinner, we photographed our badges together with the program book. Then we went to see Masquerade and, after the usual lengthy judging, returned to the Marriott Hotel.

On Sunday, I got up a little later and attended a couple of panels - Search for Life and Pluto Redeemed (why Pluto should be reclassified as a

planet, with the panel taking jabs at Neil DeGrasse Tyson for his part in demoting Pluto to a planetoid).

They were both happy to give me their autographs and spend some time talking, which was very nice.

Next were two more panels - the Star Trek cast, and the Starship Troopers cast, in case you'd missed them on the Saturday and after the panels, I met with a few remaining Crewmembers for an Asian buffet at Manor Buffet, similar to the Flaming Grill Buffet we have in NJ.

After four fun-filled, busy days, it was time to pack and get ready to go home. I got up early, had breakfast and headed home. Once again, it was a very enjoyable and fun vacation and, yes, I'm looking forward to Shore Leave 46!

Bronx Anime and Comic Book Expo, New York, US

2 August 2025 From interview with Captain Anthony Perez



The USS *Osiris*, a New York City chapter in Region 7, had a recruiting table at a small, one-day con in the Bronx - the Bronx Anime and Comic Book Expo, a small-scale event in a church basement.

Billed on the convention's website as "the Bronx #1 Show that brings family and friends together and all types of collectors from comic book to toys, anime lovers, cosplayers, and wrestling fans. Hosts a cosplay contest and video games."

The main attractions were guest actor,

Jennifer Silverman, local comic book artists Criss Madd, Will Torres and Keith Williams, vendor tables including the 501st Legion - Star Wars Costumers, and the ever-popular costume contest.

A local convention with people of all ages attending, families, individuals, young ones, all into science fiction, mainly into Star Wars, Star Trek, Doctor Who and Marvel, with a bunch of cosplayers - maybe not as big an event as other local conventions, New York Comic Con and Undiscovered Realm, but still attracting a decent showing of visitors ranging from average people to hardcore sci-fi fans.

The USS Osiris's recruiting table featured a chapter sign, Borg figure, model of the USS 1701-E, signup sheet, gold pins available to buy with the chapter logo and, the main attraction ... a candy dish filled with sweets. CO, Captain Perez and Comms Officer, Elaine Turner, were on duty, in TNG outfits, and lots of visitors were interested to come up and chat with them, with 18 signing up to hear more and, hopefully, translating into new members.

Bronx Anime and Comic Book Expo

USS Animus at Oz Comic Con Canberra, New South Wales, Australia

9-10 August 2025 From interview with Captain Ross Manuel



As winter draws to a close in the southern hemisphere, the USS *Animus* was out in force in the country's capital, at Oz Comic Con Canberra.

Eight crew and two cadets took turns manning the *Animus* booth with the captain, always ensuring at least 4 at the booth - manning the chair, the info area with all the props, and usually one crewmember out in the 6x3 space to engage and take photos.



A fun challenge at the event is a kind of con bingo, and just visiting the *Animus* booth gets you the chance to check 3 off the list - take a photo with a full-size prop, do a Vulcan salute with a Trekkie, and take a photo with a group of people from the same fandom show.



This is the *Animus's* fourth time running a booth here, with the same 8 crew, and the setup has evolved over time, to now have Captain's Chair, backdrop, Tribbles (because everyone wants those), and a range of props - phasers, tricorders, communicators, phase rifles - some 3D printed, some original production.

Captain Manuel noted an almost universal attraction - whether Star Trek fans, other fandoms, guests, other stall holders alike ... wanna sit in the Captain's Chair. "One of the things I always see is the judges will come and seek out the chair " ... for the winners and the cosplay guests, or the celebrity guests - they want them to sit in the chair to get the iconic photos.

On the *Animus* booth, they found a lot of younger visitors saying that their mum or dad enjoyed *Star Trek*, and so they'd get a photo in the chair to show them.



As a crew, there is no set uniform, but they tend to lean towards Nemesis (shifting towards the Picard uniform). Officially, though, they are set to the year 2375, Nemesis, grey and black, art and iconography set at that point, with *Animus* badge, an Assassin's Creed logo within an ST Delta (as the original founders and members of the group were as big fans as AC as ST).

The Legion booth was next door, as always, and the camaraderie between the two groups is excellent - everyone just gets along, supportive during the event, swapping patches and coins (Captain Manuel pointed to the extensive collection of patches behind him), and enjoying the event together harmoniously (in spite of the general public's apparent obsession with a non-existent rivalry). "So, we get to enjoy seeing Darth Vader in the Captain's Chair, or one of us (Trekkies) walking away with a light sabre. We have fun - take photos of one another, there's never any animosity.'



The venue was a multi-hall convention centre (the description reminded me of Birmingham's NEC in England) and, on the same weekend as Oz Con, they were sharing the venue with shows for thoroughbred horse racing, caravanning and a ski show.

Canberra's relatively low population leads to a niche type of convention, with 15-20,000 visitors in total, an audience of families and younger people and, of these, around 40% in cosplay ... but, those who were, were in very elaborate niche cosplays K-Pop Demon Hunters or Critical Role, or Star Wars, Dr. Who, Pokémon, but very few legacy costumes (early 90s franchises). As a whole, younger fans go more for anime and video game characters, furries, some Marvel, and generally referencing newer shows. One of the big features of this event is the chance for cosplayers to compete in Champion of Cosplay of Australia with heats at multiple locations leading to regional heats to qualify, and the winner going on to next tier, to try and qualify for the international competition.

Overall impression of the convention - good! Very busy, the event attracted a diverse crowd of families, adults,

middle aged people, families, kids, teenagers and adults getting dressed up, and it was good to get together with the group and community. "We use the conventions as an excuse to get dressed up and do nerdy (*REDACTED*) with people we like."

USS Veritas at Military HeroCon, Fort Hood, Texas, US 16-17 August 2025 From LT William "Bill" Sturgeon



The USS Veritas has successfully completed its first diplomatic recruitment mission in the Killeen TX region at the docking facility of Military HeroCon on Fort Hood. This mission, collectively, was our first convention outing as a unit, was deemed successful and a good dry run, and allowed us to understand what worked and what didn't work in preparation for larger, smoother operations in future. The most noteworthy occurrence, particularly for STARFLEET Intelligence, was that a Klingon Governor was in attendance and, while relations remained cordial, it was clear that the Klingon way of life seemed to align more with the denizens in attendance; this should be studied further.

The crew of the USS *Veritas*, based in Killeen Texas, had our first convention-based recruitment table, at Military Hero Con, next to the Clothing and Sales store (where you can buy military uniforms and accoutrements) on Fort Hood.





This is a new convention, with iterations being held on various Army and Air Force Bases. It's organised through the Army and Air Force Exchange Service (AAFES), which is free and open to the public.

At Fort Hood, there were multiple celebrities, primarily skewed towards Anime voice actors, and including Glenn Morshower (who has a TNG appearance to his credit), Ray Hurd, Charles Campbell, Adam Gibbs (who we were next to and is a super nice guy), Kenny James, Phil Parsons, Lindsay Sheppard, Molly Searcy, Jennie Kwan, Olivia Hack and Christina Kelly.

Our chapter crew all agreed that this was a great starter con. If you have a family member or friend who has never been to a con and are interested but maybe put off by large crowds or high ticket prices, we recommend they try Military Hero Con; it's free and a great introduction. (If you don't already have base access, you could still attend, you just had to go to the visitor center to obtain a pass.)

The only downside to the con, and I'd be negligent if I didn't address it, was that it wasn't widely promoted, so the number of attendees was maybe lighter than we'd hoped for getting our chapter name out to as many people as possible. So, hopefully this will not be the case in the future, and I'll report on the next Military Hero Con at Fort Hood in November.



The unknown Klingon Governor I mentioned was myself btw. I'm still slightly new to STARFLEET, but I've been doing Klingon since 1992, and Klingons always seem to draw attention. So I elected to be the foil to

the Veritas during the con.

The crew had fun, and we seemed to grow our chapters numbers by a couple, so it was a win!

I highly encourage our STARFLEET brethren to check out a Military HeroCon if there is one near you.

FIRST FLEET CELEBRATES SCIENCE

The 2024 Science Awards in **Region One Sciences**

Region One Sciences is part of STARFLEET's Region One regional department program. The Regional Division Chiefs (RDCs) facilitate communication among ships within the region with a focus on departmental activities and issues affecting these departments. One of the ways Region One Sciences does this is by hosting a <u>Chief Science Officer Handbook</u>. The chapter Chief Science Officers in R/1 submit monthly reports to me, which I summarize in my monthly Sciences report. These feed into annual science awards.

There are three basic awards in Region One Sciences: The Albert Einstein Award for regular reporting to the RDC, the Steven R. Hawking Award for most original submission to a newsletter or listserver, and the Galileo Award for Chief Science Officer of the Year (. The Einstein Award is determined by the RDC, while the Hawking and Galileo awards are determined by the region's CSOs.

The COVID pandemic impacted the science awards program such that there were no science awards given out in 2022 and 2023. Consequently, the 2024 Einstein Award covered all 3 years. For 2022-2024, I received reports from 20 chapters in total – 20 ships in 2022, 12 ships in 2023, and 9 ships in 2024. The Einstein Award winners for reporting every month are:

These winners were announced early this year on the Region One staff listserver. Please join me in congratulating the above fine officers for their dedication.

The 2024 Hawking and Galileo awards covered activities for just 2024. The winners for these awards, and three new ones created this year, were announced at the May 2-4, 2025, Region One Summit in Gatlinburg, TN. Candidates for the Hawking and Galileo awards are nominated by R/1 CSOs and voted on by R/1 CSOs. There were 4 nominees for the Hawking Award and 3 nominees for the Galileo Award. Due to the vagaries of the ranked voting method, the winner of both the Hawking and Galileo awards was COMM Michael Lewis. CSO of the USS Potomac. COMM. Lewis submits interesting articles on variable stars in his monthly reports, and he manages the STARFLEET Pinterest program and serves as my able Assistant RDC. Congratulations, Michael!

Two new awards were created to recognize those nominees of the Hawking and Galileo awards who didn't win. The Region One Supernova Award is given to a CSO whose chapter activities show an explosion of creativity and leadership (these are basically the runners-up in the Galileo Award category). The winners of the Supernova Award include ADM Willy Smith of the USS Heimdal and FCAPT Nancy Hall of the USS Jurassic. Adm. Smith and FCAPT Hall led numerous activities (many science-related) aboard their ships in 2024. The Region One Quasar Award is given to a CSO whose science contributions shine brightly throughout the year (these are the runners-up in the Hawking Award category). The winners of the Quasar Award include RADM. Janice Graham of the USS Renegade, LT David Lyons of the USS Ronald E. McNair, and LTJG Teressa Collins of the USS Tanasi. RADM Graham, LT Lyons, and LTJG Collins include interesting science articles in

their monthly reports. Please join me in congratulating these fine officers for their accomplishments!

I especially wanted to give a shout-out to two CSOs. The McNair's LT Lyons researches and writes up an article every month on a scientific topic and puts it in his report to me. In 2024 these included a history of NASA, the Quiet Zone in the central Appalachians, the Supermoon lunar eclipse, the Boeing Starliner spacecraft, the BOAT gamma ray burst, the James Webb Space Telescope, the CAARE weather control experiment, Alzheimer's Disease, and quantum teleportation. The *Tanasi's* LTJG Collins posts science articles to the ship's discord server and includes about half a dozen of them in her monthly report to me. Some 2024 posts discussed the Mars Perseverance rover, the T Coronae Borealis nova explosion, what defines a species, spacecraft evolution over the next 25 years, evidence of water found in the metal god of war exoplanet, ultra-thin solar coating can turn phone cases and EVs into mini power generators, satellite data showing climate change is real, super star cluster Westerlund 1, first-ever clear image of a star in another galaxy, how the Great Filter could explain why we haven't found intelligent aliens, why our knowledge of exoplanets has exploded in the last three decades, potentially habitable planet TRAPPIST-1b may have a carbon dioxide-rich atmosphere, and Did plate tectonics give rise to life? I love reading these fascinating articles each month and find it exciting that STARFLEET members are sharing in the joy of learning about science!

The third new award created this year was suggested by my Assistant RDC, COMM Lewis. The new award is the Region One Solar Eclipse Award for Promoting Science and is given to any STARFLEET member for promoting science amongst STARFLEET members and non-members. The winner of the 2024 Solar Eclipse Award is FCAPT Jared Finkenbinder of Region 17. During Eclipse Ambassador Zoom meetings and PowerPoint presentations run by COMM Lewis, Jared assisted in helping students learn more about science and our solar system. Congratulations, Jared!
